

Economic and entrepreneurial dimension


- a) continuous activity producing goods and selling services;
- b) high degree of autonomy
- c) significant level of economic risk
- d) minimum amount of paid work

Social dimensions

- e) explicit aim to benefit the community
- f) initiative launched by a group of citizens or civil society organisations
- g) limited profit distribution

Participatory governance

- h) high degree of autonomy
- i) decision-making power not based on capital ownership
- j) participatory nature, which involves various parties affected by the activity
